1967 - I worked as a student intern at the Verdmont Youth Camp, a secure facility for juvenile offenders run by San Bernardino County, California. My responsibilities included counseling youthful offenders, including many gang members, about issues related to drug and alcohol abuse.

1971 - I worked as a student intern counselor at the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC) for Men and Women at Chino. CRC was a minimum security prison for adult offenders who were heroin users. I dealt mostly with drug and alcohol-related issues.

1980 - I worked as a teacher at The Washington State Prison in Walla Walla, a maximum security prison. A number of my students were drug dealers, drug abusers, and gang members. I also taught robbers, rapists, arsonists, and murderers. Most of my students had histories of alcohol abuse. I did a good deal of alcohol and drug abuse counseling with this group.

1990-1992 - I worked as a teacher at the Federal Correctional Institute in

Englewood, Colorado, a medium-security prison for federal criminal law violators. Many of my students were drug dealers, drug users, and gang members. Others were bank robbers, murderers, rapists, and arsonists. Almost all of my students had alcohol abuse problems. I did a great deal of alcohol and drug abuse counseling with this group.
