OKLAHOMA

Jamie Pybas, Interim Executive Director of Oklahoma Indigent Defense System v. Hon. Jeff Crites, 2025 OK 63 (September 30, 2025): **Oklahoma Survivors Act**: Judge Crites ordered OIDS to represent a Petitioner seeking resentencing under the OSA. OIDS sought to enjoin this and the Court agreed.

<u>Shane Nichlos</u>, No. 122,309 (Okla. Civ. App., Div. I, October 3, 2025) (Released for Publication): **Sex Offender Registration**: Denial of petition for removal from the sex offender registry is reversed. NOTE: Judge Prince dissented.

TENTH CIRCUIT

United States v. Matthew Cline, No. 24-1119 (10th Cir., August 21, 2025) (Published) (Hartz, Kelly & Carson): Forfeiture; Evidence (Co-Defendant Guilty Pleas); Jury Instructions (Deliberate Ignorance): Convictions for a fraud scheme are affirmed over claims relating to: 1) permitting the Government to introduce evidence of a testifying co-participant's guilty plea as substantive evidence of guilt; and 2) instructing the jury that it could find the requisite mental state for conviction if the defendant was deliberately ignorant of the fraud. The Government cross-appealed a forfeiture order and the panel vacated and remanded that.

UNITED STATES SUPREME COURT

VICTORIES

HEARSAY

ARRESTS: Gov. Stitt announced that 130 illegal immigrants have been arrested while driving commercial trucks on I-40 through Oklahoma in an ICE operation titled "Operation Guardian."

POLICE: Since 2016, Tulsa P.D. has disciplined six officers suspected of drunk driving, but some were not charged with criminal offenses.

JAMMERS: The FCC has approved cellphone jammers for prisons.

SECOND CHANCE: An attorney has expressed gratitude for her second chance to practice criminal law in Oklahoma after suspension.

SEX CRIMES: In light of recent events, including the Sean Combs trial and the guilty plea by Texas mega-church pastor Robert Morris in Osage County, the Tulsa PD had discussed the 40% increase in sex crimes over the past five years in Tulsa County, particularly involving people in power.

CAMPUS: O.U. has reported an increase in serious crimes on campus.

STAFFING: The Lexington Police Department faces a staffing crisis as the Chief of Police and another officer have resigned.

<u>CALL TO RESIGN</u>: Bobby Don Gifford has called for the resignation of the current U.S. Attorney.

OUSTED: Ousted Oklahoma County Jail CEO Paul Timmons says that he was blindsided and believes that his departure was because of his determination to investigate a threat made by one jail executive to another.

PRINTS: Two Irish scientists have developed a process that allows the "Holy Grail in forensic investigation": fingerprint recovery from brass ammunition shells that have been exposed to the high temperature conditions during gunfire.

<u>COLD CASES</u>: Criminal Justice/Forensics students at the University of Texas at Arlington will jointly investigate cold cases with the Arlington P.D.

TRAFFIC STOPS: Lawton's Z94 radio station has explained that traffic stops in Oklahoma might be a bit different going forward, including having the officer take a photo of the driver.

DRONES: Here is the story from DOC about its use of drones to combat lobbers at Red RockCC/Lawton CF. Also, story **HERE**.

COKE: OBN has intercepted a 560-pound shipment of cocaine.

SHOT: A man impersonating a police officer has been shot dead by a real police officer in Yukon.

<u>ICE</u>: The Diamondback prison facility in Watonga will re-open as an ICE holding facility.

<u>COMMUNICATION</u>: OKC PD has launched the Blue Envelope Program for people experiencing "communication challenges" so that they can have safer interactions with police officers.

<u>JAM</u>: Since the FCC has approved signal-jamming technology, the DOC is one step closer to blocking contraband phone calls.

SUSPENDED: The Oilton Chief of Police has been suspended.

PREGNANCY: Oklahoma prosecutors have filed the second-highest number of pregnancy-related crimes in the U.S. (after Alabama).

WACKY CRIME

ROUND-UP: Moore police had a late-night rodeo rounding up cows on the loose.

GIANT: Lewis Wilkins, a/k/a "The Oklahoma Giant" because he stood 8'2" and weighed 365 pounds, is buried near Enid.
